Solemnity of St. Anthony of Padua
Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

Mark 4:26-34

In today's gospel reading from Mark, we hear two stories, or parables, about farming. In the first one, the farmer scatters seeds in his fields, and then does nothing else to help them grow. And, yet, even without his help, the seeds grow into plants that flourish and produce fruit. The second story is about the mustard seed, which is one of the tiniest of all seeds. When planted, this teeny tiny seed grows into a plant that is about as tall as the ceiling in your home and becomes a home for birds. The mustard seed story seems to tell us that even from such small, humble beginnings, truly great things can happen! In these parables, the seeds represent faith, our belief in God. This faith is planted deep inside us, and as we grow, so does our faith!

What are some of the things that your parents and teachers do to help faith "grow" in you? Brainstorm some things that you can do to help your faith grow.

Today's scriptures: Ezek 17:22-24; Psalm 92:2-3,13-16; 2 Cor 5:6-10; Mark 4:26-34.

God the Father in the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC)

239 By calling God "Father," the language of faith indicates two main things: that God is the first origin of everything and transcendent authority; and that he is at the same time goodness and loving care for all his children. God's parental tenderness can also be expressed by the image of motherhood, which emphasizes God's immanence, the intimacy between Creator and creature. The language of faith thus draws on the human experience of parents, who are in a way the first representatives of God for man. But this experience also tells us that human parents are fallible and can disfigure the face of fatherhood and motherhood. We ought therefore to recall that God transcends the human distinction between the sexes. He is neither man nor woman: he is God. He also transcends human fatherhood and motherhood, although he is their origin and standard: no one is father as God is Father. See also CCC 238-248.

Graduation Announcements!

On May 3, 2024, Patrick Gregory Di Loreto, grandson of Florence Di Loreto, received his completion of the configuration stage at Mount St. Mary's Seminary in Emmitsburg, MD, with a Master of Divinity and Master of Arts/Theology in Church History. For the Diocese of Colorado Springs and the Archdiocese for the Military Services, he was ordained a Catholic Priest on June 8, 2024 in Colorado Springs, CO.

St. Anthony of Padua, the patron saint of our church, was born in 1195 in Lisbon (now Portugal). His baptismal name was Fernando. He entered the religious order of St. Augustine at age 15. At age 17, he began studying Augustinian theology in Coimbra and was most likely ordained a priest during this time. Inspired by five Franciscan martyrs returned in solemn procession from Morocco, he decided to become Franciscan and joined the convent of St. Anthony, taking the name of Anthony.

St. Anthony is known as the "finder of lost items" based on a story of finding his missing book of Psalms. This Psalter was hand-written (this was before printing presses!) and contained personal notes and comments in it that he would use in teaching—so it was very valuable! A Franciscan novice leaving the community was thought to have stolen his book. Anthony prayed for the Psalter to be returned and a short time later, the novice had a change of heart, returned the book, and asked for forgiveness. The student returned to religious life with conviction. St. Anthony's Psalter is preserved today in the Franciscan Monastery in Bologna, Italy. Many now ask St. Anthony's intercession for lost or stolen items as well as souls in need of prayers for conversion or return to the Faith.

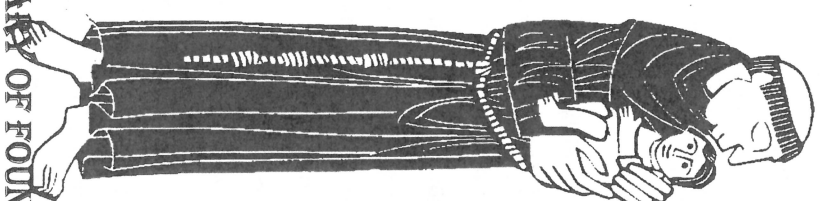
